The six main beliefs

- 1. Belief in Allah as the one and only God.
- 2. Belief in angels.
- 3. Belief in the holy books.
- 4. Belief in the prophets and that Muhammad was the final prophet.
- 5. Belief in the Day of Judgement (the day when Allah decides if a person goes to heaven or hell).
- 6. Belief in predestination (the belief that Allah has already planned out what will happen).

Powerful knowledge

The Five Pillars of Islam are some basic acts in Islam, considered mandatory by believers, and are the foundation of Muslim life. The Five Pillars are summarised in the famous hadith of Gabriel. The word 'Islam' means submission and obedience to Allah.

Most Muslims try to follow the teachings of the Qur'an but many also use Hadith and Sunnah as forms of guidance as to how to live their lives. The Mosque is a place of prayer and teaching but also a centre of Islamic life, a very important part of the community.
